*Caring Enough to Confront: How to Understand and Express Your Deepest Feelings Toward Others* by David Augsberger. **From one reader**: "Growing up, I was under the impression that confrontation was a negative thing - that if I confronted a person about an issue then that meant I was a bad person for having poor or hurt feelings. After I read *Caring Enough to Confront* I understood that confrontation could actually be a positive response to negative behavior. I highly recommend this book for anyone suffering from the confrontation jitters."

# **Books on conflict resolution (2)**

PEACE MAKER KEN SANDE

The bestselling book, *The Peacemaker: A Biblical Guide to Resolving Personal Conflict* (available from the MMCT library) launched a ministry that has touched thousands. Peacemaker Ministries now has a website that includes resources to help Christians in conflict (found under

RESOURCES in the menu bar). Three of the many articles available are Getting to the Heart of Conflict and The Slippery Slow of Conflict by the book's author, Ken Sande, and How to Deal with Those Who Differ with Us by professor Roger Nicole.



**Two for Free:** The thought-provoking books of Anabaptist author Johann Christoph Arnold are available for free-download in English.

German, French, Spanish and Korean at the Ploughshares Publishing website. Among the fifty titles you'll find there are *Why Forgive?* and *Seeking Peace*. Both are reflective, farranging meditations about resolving conflicts and making peace -- with God, ourselves and others, both individually and corporately.

### **Articles and radio programs**

Two brochures by counselor Ron Kotesky are available on his website: What You Need to Know about Conflict and Reconciliation. He also produced a three-part radio program with Al Stewart called Reconciliation that's available for downloading. "While it takes one person to forgive, it takes two people to be reunited."



## Cross-cultural conflicts: How to avoid them, how to heal them


